Around the end of March 2011, Zaad Lathiff, a senior transport officer, commercial vehicles, at the NZ Transport Agency in Palmerston North, came to us to discuss his options for undertaking a reputable logistics and supply chain management qualification. Zaad had applied for, and been awarded, a CILT NZ Transport **Research and Educational Trust** Award to cover his fees and was keen to start as soon as possible. "When I read through the first module of the Professional Diploma in Logistics & Transport course, I wondered how I had got myself into this mess. How was I going to get through this? It had been a very long time since I had done professional studies," Zaad says.

"Receiving the trust award enabled me to sign up for the diploma, but now I had to reorganise myself to accommodate studies while balancing other aspects of my life, including work. Initially I found it extremely difficult to adapt to the new routine, but with some inner discipline I managed to settle in.

"It was a matter of dedication and taking responsibility for my own commitment. Always in the back of my mind was the thought that I was accountable to the funding agencies, and this was one of the main encouraging factors for me to complete the course of studies. "Today, I am proud of myself that through discipline, encouragement, dedication and support I turned my 'plight' into a smooth 'flight' and took off to complete the CILT UK Professional Diploma with good grades.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank Walter and Tessa Glass for extending their invaluable support. It came at times when I desperately needed it. I also sincerely thank my manager at work for keeping an eye on my workload – his support contributed to me submitting the completed tasks ahead of their
